To access ProQuest, follow the links on your library web page or consult your librarian for instructions.

1. Basic Search

Basic search offers quick document retrieval based on keywords.

Ex.: Find documents about the 2010 Winter Olympics in Vancouver.

1. Click the **Basic** tab to access this area.
2. Type Vancouver and Olympics into the search box.
3. Click the **Search Tips** link for additional guidance. For example, you may decide to add quotes for the phrase "Vancouver Olympic Committee".
4. Choose search limits

Database (if available): Check this menu for other databases your library may offer in addition to Canadian Newsstand.

Date Range: Choose specific or general dates.

More Search Options: For example: focus the search on a specific author or newspaper.

5. Run the search.

2. Working with Results

Results Sorting

- A drop down menu orders results by most recent or most relevant first.
- Use links to limit results to records with full text.

Set Up Alerts

- Schedule periodic email delivery of new results.

My Research

- Format citations to specific styles, such as MLA or APA
- Email marked documents in a batch
- Export citations to bibliographic software (Endnote, ProCite, etc.)
- Create a page of links back to selected documents or searches.
- To add items to My Research, simply click the check box for the document.

3. Advanced search

Advanced search offers an array of tools for utilizing ProQuest's detailed indexing.

Ex.: Find stories from Ottawa discussing the softwood lumber dispute.

1. Click the **Advanced** tab to access this area.
2. Select **Dateline** from the first menu, and type Ottawa in the search-entry box.
3. In the second search-entry box, type the quoted phrase "softwood lumber dispute", and select **Citation and document text** from the second menu.
4. Run the search.

Ex.: Track stories on the Juno Awards in the Arts & Life section of The National Post.

1. Click the **Advanced** tab to access this area.
2. Type "Juno Awards" in the first search-entry box and select Citation and document text from the first menu.

3. Type “Arts & Life” in the second search-entry box and select **Section** from the second menu.
4. Type “National Post” in the third search-entry box and select **Publication title** from the third menu.
4. Run the search.

Ex.: Find articles from the Halifax Daily News in which the company Bombardier is featured prominently.

1. Click the **Advanced** tab to access this area.
2. Click on **More Search Options** (if not already expanded).
3. Open the **Browse Companies** link. Find the company Bombardier and click the **Add to Search** button.
4. Type Daily News and Halifax in the second search-entry box and select **Publication title** from the second menu. [Note: There are multiple publication bearing the title “Daily News”. In order to search to a specific title please specify the location and connect it to the common title using the Boolean AND operator].
5. Run the search.

5. Publication search

Use Publication search to browse for issues of a particular newspaper.

1. Click the **Publication** tab to access this area.
2. Type a word or words from a publication’s title in the search entry box, or browse using the A-Z navigation bar.
3. Click on the hyperlinked title of interest to expose available issues.
4. Click on the date you wish to view. Articles will be listed in alphabetical order by article title. To the right and above of the first article listed, please locate a drop-down menu labeled **Sort results by:**. Articles may be resorted by page number.

6. Additional Suggestions

More Like This

You’ve located the perfect document, now find others that are similar. **More Like This** can be found at the bottom of ProQuest documents. Select indexed terms you like, and ProQuest will search for matching documents.

Create a Web Page

Download or email a page of links back to selected documents or searches. Durable links are suitable for posting on an Intranet site. Search links automatically refresh with new content. Create a Web Page is a component of the **My Research** tab.
